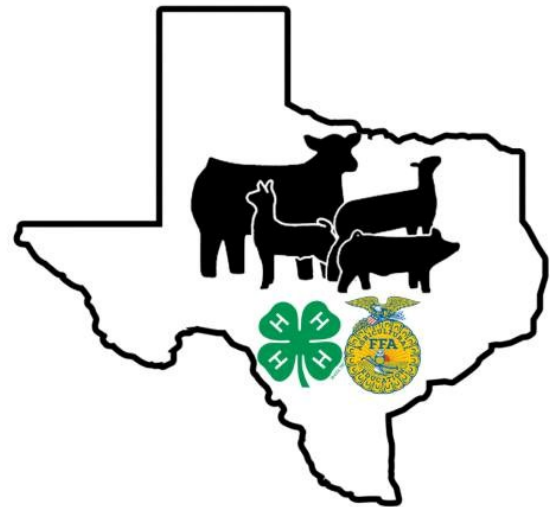

- 11. Project requirements:** Each project must be the original work of the participant(s). Projects must demonstrate workmanship/craftsmanship, functionality, innovation, design, degree of difficulty, documentation, and overall quality relevant to agricultural mechanics. Projects must be in place by time and date listed on the schedule. Judging will follow the schedule. All projects must be complete on show day and every attempt will be made to maintain safety for all during the show.
- 12. Other relevant information:** Offloading assistance is not guaranteed. The judge(s) will not award premiums or points for entries that do not meet acceptable standards of quality or if the build is questioned of originality. Only exhibitors present at time of awards will be eligible for awards. The participant(s) understand that the reading, or lack of, does not necessarily indicate they agree or disagree with the outlined rules. They further understand they Agriculture Mechanics show officials have the right to make decisions based upon any given circumstances, if agreed upon by the superintendent, in order to keep the show fair and impartial.
- 13. Final interpretation:** The interpretation of these rules and any unforeseen circumstances will be at the discretion of the show organizers as mentioned above.

- 5. Display and presentation:** Participants are responsible for setting up and presenting their projects as directed by show officials. Projects must remain on display for the duration of the show unless otherwise authorized by the show board.
- 6. Disqualification criteria:** Projects may be disqualified for non-compliance with safety regulations, plagiarism, incomplete submission, or failure to adhere to show rules. Any form of misrepresentation or dishonesty will result in immediate disqualification.
- 7. Prizes and awards:** Prizes will be awarded based on the judges' scores and may include but not limited to certificates, ribbons, buckles, prizes, trophies, or monetary awards.
- 8. Code of Conduct:** Participants must exhibit sportsmanship and professionalism throughout the show. Any disruptive behavior including but not limited to: vandalism, language, theft, or harassment, will result in immediate disqualification and removal from the premises.
- 9. Photography & media:** Show officials may photograph or record projects and participants for promotional purposes. Participants grant permission for their likeness and project details to be used in promotional materials.
- 10. Statement of Student Originality Form/Liability:** Projects for the Parmer County Agriculture Mechanics Show shall be student led, student constructed, and student driven in all aspects of the project's lifespan. Participants shall be led under the supervision of a Parmer County AST or CEA. The SSO form is a contract stating the contestant has abided by such ethical values, whereas, parents, guardians, community members, professionals, or any other person not indicated in the "Participant Eligibility" shall have no help or right to be a part of the construction, leadership, or drive in the development of an entry project for the show. Therefore, a "Statement of Student Originality/Liability Form" shall be signed and submitted WITH the project at show. This form shall not be turned in with the entry. Failure to have a properly signed form results in disqualification. By entering the show, participants release organizers, sponsors and venue from any liability for injuries or damages to oneself, project, supplies, vehicles, or anything of value and all responsibility, thereof, Parmer County Stock Show, FFA chapters, 4-H Clubs, and all other entities shall not be held responsible.

Parmer County Agriculture Mechanics Show Contest Rules

The purpose of the Agricultural Mechanics contest is to provide an opportunity for FFA & 4-H members to display projects constructed in agricultural mechanics laboratories. It is also to promote the development of skills in agricultural mechanics through competition and recognize individual/team accomplishments in said area. The contest strives to provide an opportunity for the public to develop an appreciation of this important component of FFA & 4-H youth programs.

- 1. Eligibility:** The show is open to high school students (9th-12th grade) enrolled in FFA and/or 4-H in Parmer County. Contestants and projects are to be under the supervision of a Parmer County AST or CEA. Participants must adhere to “No Pass, No Play” state mandated rules in order to be eligible. If an exhibitor is not scholastically eligible by UIL rules, then the exhibitor and his/her project(s) are not eligible to compete in this show.
- 2. Safety Regulations:** Safety is paramount. Participants must follow all safety protocols outlined in the show guidelines. Proper attire, including safety goggles, gloves, and closed-toes shoes, is mandatory in work areas. Projects must adhere to local, state, and federal safety standards.
- 3. Entry Submission:** Members must register their project by the specified deadline. Projects must be completed and ready for display or demonstration on the designated show date. Entries are to only begin as early as one day after the previous agriculture mechanics show and completed within one academic year to show the next show. Contestants and entries should be certified via “Statement of Student Originality/Accountability Form” and signed by the AST or CEA.
- 4. Judging Criteria:** Projects will be evaluated based on workmanship/craftsmanship, functionality, innovation, design, degree of difficulty, documentation, and overall quality. Judges may also consider the participant’s ability to explain and demonstrate the project’s purpose and construction.

5. Animals will be sold on a percentage of breed basis and proportioned among weight classes. Breed champions and reserve breed champions will be sold. If selling both the champion and reserve champion exceeds the number of animals allocated on a percentage basis, the percentage of other breeds will be adjusted accordingly to remain within the sale animal limit. Should a breed champion eligible for the sale be pulled due to the sale limit rule, the system will revert to the percentage procedure.
6. **Sale Checks-** Sale checks will be mailed from the PCJLS to the County Agent/Ag Advisors as soon as possible. Checks will be distributed to participants after thank-you letters are written.
7. Exhibitors will walk through the ring without their animal(s).
8. Two percent (2%) of the selling price of the animals will be retained by PCJLS for repair and improvement of the show facilities as well as promotion of the PCJLS Premium Sale.
9. Premium on animals will be done by the head.
10. Sale order will rotate on a yearly basis with the Grand and Reserve Grand of each species selling in the same order at the beginning of the sale.

Junior Livestock Premium Sale

1. A Junior Livestock Premium Sale will be held under the auspices of a committee directly responsible to and appointed by the PCJLS Stock Show Board. The auction will begin promptly at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday, January 18, 2025, following the Buyers' Luncheon. A maximum of 40% of steers, lambs, barrows, goats exhibited as well as 2 dairy heifers, 2 beef heifers, and 2 rabbits will be sold. In the event that there are less than 140 head in the sale, then the total number sold will be 140 with the remaining sale slots to be divided equally between the steer, lamb, goat, and pig divisions. Order of sale will be determined by the Sale Committee.
2. No animal, or representation of same animal, sold through a premium sale or auction during the ownership period shall be eligible to show at PCJLS.
3. **Sale Limit:** One 4-H or FFA member will be allowed to sell up to two (2) animals in the premium sale. If an exhibitor has more than two (2) animals qualify for the sale, the premium sale animals will be designated as follows: the exhibitor's two (2) highest placing animals will be sold. Should the exhibitor have more than two animals qualify and be of the same placing, then the heavier weight animals will sell. (Ex: 1st place steer, 3rd place barrow, 3rd place lamb- the steer and barrow would sell. The steer was the highest placing animal and the barrow weighed more than the lamb of equal placing.)
4. **Pulls:** If an animal that has placed high enough to qualify for the premium sale is pulled because their owner has two other animals in the sale, the next lower placing animal in that class will be eligible for the sale. This will continue until all sale slots are filled. If a class is completely pulled through, then the eligible slot is given to the biggest class within that breed/division.

General Rules

- 1. Eligibility:** The Parmer County Junior Livestock Show is open to all 4-H & FFA members under the supervision of the county agent or vocational agriculture teachers of the county. Exhibitors must be enrolled in grades 3 through 12 in one of the four public schools in the county or they must be a resident of Parmer County attending a home/private school in grades 3 through 12. The state mandated “No Pass, No Play” rules shall apply to all exhibitors. If an exhibitor is not scholastically eligible by UIL rules, then the exhibitor and his/her project(s) are not eligible to compete in this show.
- 2. Entry Deadline/Fees:** All entries and fees will be done through the exhibitor’s agent/advisor. All entries will then be processed through ShoWorks by the agent/advisor. **All entries will be processed no later than December 31.** **Local entry deadlines may be set by the county agent or vocational ag teacher before this date. Late entries will be accepted however, they will be DOUBLE the fee and must be paid in cash only.** Entry fees have set at a rate: \$20/steer; \$20/lamb; \$20/goat; \$20/barrow; \$20/dairy heifer; \$5/rabbit; \$20/beef heifer; and \$20/project for ag mech. There will be no refunds on projects entered but not brought to the show.
- 3. Validation/Ownership:** All animals must be validated and tagged through the Texas Youth Livestock Validation Program by the appropriate date. All animals entered to show must have been continuously owned by the exhibitor and fed under the supervision of the county agent or vocational ag teacher as follows:

Steers- June 30

Lambs- October 31

Goats- October 31

Barrows- November 30

Dairy Heifers- November 1

Rabbits- 5 weeks prior to show date

Any animals sold through a premium sale during the ownership period will be deemed ineligible for entry.

Rabbits

1. General Show rules apply
2. Grand & Reserve Grand rabbits will sell in the premium sale.
3. Jackpot show payout being 3rd-50%, 4th– 30%, and 5th– 20%.
4. Rabbits must be a commercial meat rabbit breed such as Californian, New Zealand, Champagne D’Argent, Satin, Standard Rex, etc.
5. Age Limit is 12 weeks old
6. Maximum weight at time of show is 6 lbs. Rabbits will be weighed by show staff before the show begins.
7. All rabbits must have identifying number or breeder tattoo visible in rabbit’s left ear.
8. Exhibitors will be limited to 4 entries.
9. Exhibitors are responsible for bringing and showing their rabbit to judging table.
10. Weigh- In begins @ 1:30 p.m. on Tuesday Jan 13, 2026.
11. **Entry Fee \$5.00/head.**

Beef Heifers

1. **General Rules.** All entries in the Beef Heifer Show will be subject to the General Rules and Regulations and to Special Rules of the Junior Livestock Department published in this book, insofar as they pertain to beef cattle.
2. **Arrival Time.** All beef heifers must be in their stalls by 10:00 am Tuesday of stock show week.
3. **Show time.** Beef heifer show will begin at 30 minutes after the conclusion of the market steer senior showmanship class.
4. **Number of Entries.** Each exhibitor will be permitted to show as many as four (4) heifers in the beef heifer show but no more than two (2) heifers in any one (1) single class with the exception of the championship classes.
5. **Dress.** Each person holding or exhibiting an animal in the ring should be dressed in appropriate show attire. Clothing worn in the ring may not bear any insignia or writing other than 4-H or FFA emblem.
6. **Date of Ownership/Validation.** Animals must be registered in the name of the exhibitor and must have been owned by the exhibitor on or before November 1, 2025, as evidenced by date of transfer, recorded date, or received date by the breed association. Registration copies must be submitted to the Parmer County Extension AgriLife Office on or by November 1, 2025. For other recorded heifers, ownership papers including RFID tag number, birth date, exhibitor name, and date of sale/date of ownership must be submitted to the Parmer County Extension AgriLife Office on or by November 1, 2025.
7. **Certificate of Registration/Ownership.** A Certificate of Registration, or Ownership paper for other recorded heifers, on each animal entered in the beef heifer show must be available and must be presented to the Superintendent of the beef heifer show for checking no later than 11:00 am on the day of arrival.
8. **Sponsored animals.** Members exhibiting animals, sponsored by an organization which is holding the Certificate of Registration, must obtain, from the sponsoring organization, a photocopy of the certificate or the certificate itself. In the case of photocopies, the sponsoring organization's official seal, logo, or letterhead must be included.
9. **Classification.** Heifers will not be divided by breed. They will be divided by date of birth.
10. **Classes.** Classes will be shown in the following order:
 1. Late Spring Heifer Calves- calved on or after May 1, 2025
 2. Spring Heifer Calves- calved: April 2025
 3. Early Spring Heifer Calves- calved: March 2025
 4. Late Winter Heifer Calves- calved: February 2025
 5. Early Winter Heifer Calves- calved: January 2025
 6. Late Fall Junior Heifers- calved: Nov.-Dec. 2024
 7. Early Fall Junior Heifers- calved: Sept.-Oct. 2024
 8. Late Summer Junior Heifers- calved: July-Aug. 2024
 9. Early Summer Junior Heifers- calved: May-June 2024
 10. Spring Senior Heifers- calved: March-April 2024
 11. Winter Senior Heifers- calved: Jan.-Feb. 2024
11. **Championship Classes.** Only animals receiving a first place in the classes listed above will be eligible for the championship awards.
12. **Premium Sale.** The grand and reserve grand overall will be eligible for the premium sale. If one of them should pull, then the next eligible heifer will bump in. The judge shall rank the top 11 heifers.
13. **Entry fee. \$20 per head.**

4. **Number of Entries:** Exhibitors may enter up to four (4) animals per specie with a maximum of seven (7) head total.

5. Weigh In/Classification:

Steers- All weights and classifications must be completed by 10:30 am Tuesday

Rabbits- 1:30-2:00 p.m.- Tuesday

Goats- 3:00-6:00 p.m.- Tuesday

Lambs- 3:00-6:00 p.m.- Tuesday

Barrows- 3:00-6:30 p.m.- Wednesday

Re-weighs: Any animal that does not weigh within the required weight ranges at its initial weigh-in will be allowed one re-weigh. The re-weigh must occur during the scheduled weigh-in time for that species.

6. **Pen Assignments:** Pens and stalls will be numbered and assigned by the general superintendent by community. Pen space may be limited so it is the responsibility of the exhibitor to bring dividers. Pens/stalls must be cleaned out before being released. Failure to do so will result in a \$100 fine per pen/stall. Fine money will revert to the steak dinner monies.

7. **Showmanship:** Beef, Goat, Lamb, Barrow, and Dairy Heifer showmanship classes will have three (3) age divisions: Junior (3rd-5th); Intermediate (6th-8th) and Senior (9th-12th). Showmanship classes will be held at the completion of judging each specie and will be open to all exhibitors of that species, within that age division. Each species judge will select showmanship winners within their division. If there are a large number of exhibitors within a division of a species, the judge may select exhibitors to come back for the showmanship class.

8. **Animal Release:** All animals must remain on the show grounds from weigh-in until released by the superintendent.

9. **Floor Prices:** Floor prices will not be set on any animals. All animals will be taken home by exhibitors after the show.

10. Substitute Showman: If the animal's owner has one of the following situations, a substitute showman is permitted:

- Conflict with another school related activity
- Physical injury or illness
- Family emergency
- More than one (1) animal in the same class

11. Protests: Any protest must be submitted in writing accompanied by \$250.00 cash which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the General Superintendent of show immediately after the occasion for such protest. Protests must be submitted either prior to judging or immediately after the conclusion of class judging. Once the animal reaches the championship judging, no protests will be accepted. Judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation. Depending on the basis of the protest, a decision may be withheld until a thorough investigation is completed. No complaint or appeal the judges or classifiers overlooked an animal will be considered. Appeals committee will air the protest and if valid, refund the deposit. If invalid, the deposit will be placed in the general fund.

12. Appeals Committee: The appeals committee shall consist of one member from the shock show board from each community and 4-H (4 in all) plus the General Superintendent for a total of five (5). A majority (3) shall represent a quorum.

13. Violations: Any exhibitor found in violation of the rules set forth in this book is subject to a review before the stock show board appeals committee and possible dismissal from all show activities.

Dairy Heifers

1. **Arrival Time:** All dairy heifers must be in place by 1:30pm Wednesday January 14, 2026.
2. **Show Time:** Dairy show will begin at 2 pm or one hour after the conclusion of the lamb show, whichever is later.
3. **Number of Entries:** Each exhibitor will be permitted to show as many as four(4) heifers in the dairy show, but no more than two(2) heifers in any one (1) single class, with the exception of the Championship classes.
4. **Dress:** Each person holding or exhibiting an animal in the ring should be dressed in white, preferably in white trousers and white shirt. Clothing may not have any insignia other than 4-H or FFA emblems.
5. **Ownership/Validation/ Registration:** Animals must be registered in the name of the exhibitor and must have been owned by the exhibitor on or before November 1, 2025, as evidence by date of transfer, record date, or received date by the breed association. Registration copies must be submitted to the Parmer County Extension AgriLife office on or by November 1, 2025. For grade heifers, ownership papers including RFID tag number, birth date, exhibitor name, and dairy of origin must be submitted to Parmer County Extension AgriLife office by November 1, 2025 and must be presented to Superintendent of dairy show at check in no later than 1:30 on day of arrival.
6. **Classification:** Heifers **will not** be divided by breed. They will be divided into classes by date of birth. Classes will be determined after all heifers have been checked in.
7. **Classes:** Classes will be shown in the Following order:
 1. Heifers, born September 1—October 15, 2025
 2. Heifers, born June - August 2025
 3. Heifers, born March—May 2025
 4. Heifers, born December 2024—February 2025
 5. Heifers, born September—November 2024
 6. Heifers, born June—August 2024 (not in milk)
 7. Heifers, born December 2023—May 2024 (not in milk)
8. **Championship Classes:** Only animal receiving 1st place in the classes listed above will be eligible for the championship awards.
9. **Premium Sale:** the Grand And Reserve Grand overall will be eligible for the premium sale. If one of them should pull, then the next eligible heifer will pull in. The judge shall rank the top 7 heifers.
10. General show rules apply. **Entry fee-\$20/ head.**

Barrows

1. Breeds shown are as follows:

Yorkshire	Berkshire	Poland China
Chester White	Duroc	Spot
Crossbred	Hampshire	Landrace

2. Class sizes will be determined at the superintendent's discretion. Show order will be determined by the superintendent.
3. Barrows must weigh 170 pounds and not over 280 to show. A five pound tolerance will be allowed.
4. Only natural grooming (water) will be allowed prior to showing any barrow. Barrows may be clipped.
5. First and second place barrows in each of the above breeds will compete for the Champion and Reserve Champion of the breed.
6. Champion and Reserve Champion of breed will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion of the show.
7. Ownership deadline is November 30, 2025.
8. All barrows must be validated under the Texas Validation Program to be eligible for the show.
9. General show rules apply. **Entry fee-\$20.00/head.**
10. There will be prospect class for all barrows weighing less than the minimum required. All barrows of all breeds will compete together in the prospect class. Barrows exhibited in the prospect class will be eligible to qualify for the premium sale at the same percentage as all other classes. The winner of the prospect class will not be eligible to compete for any breed champion, reserve champion, grand champion or reserve grand champion.
11. Breed cards will be filled out for each barrow and turned in at weigh in to classifier. Classifier decision will be final.

Market Steers

1. Breeds will be as follows:

- British
- American
- Crossbred

2. Class sizes will be determined at the superintendent's discretion.
3. Steers must weigh 900 pounds to show.
4. All Steers must be validated under the Texas Validation Program to be eligible for the show.
5. Ownership deadline is June 30, 2025.
6. Any steer deemed wild or unruly will be barred from the show.
7. The first place steers in each breed will compete for Breed Champion. The second place steer to the Breed champion may compete for Reserve Breed Champion. The three Breed Champions will compete for Grand Champion. The Reserve Breed Champion behind the Grand Champion may compete for Reserve Grand Champion.
8. Grooming:
 - No change of the major color pattern of the animals by painting or dying, will be allowed.
 - Any grooming material that allows color to come off from any animal will not be allowed at show. No adhesive materials will be allowed.
9. General show rules apply. **Entry fee-\$20.00/head**

Market Goats

1. Only wether and doe kids are eligible to show.
2. The show is open to any breed or crossbred.
3. Ownership deadline will be October 31, 2025.
4. Horns must be tipped.
5. Goats must be slick shorn.
6. There will be no adhesives, powders, or paints allowed.
7. Goats must weigh between a minimum of 60lbs and a maximum of 115lbs. A three pound tolerance will be allowed.
8. Exhibitors will be allowed to use leads or collars in the show ring.
9. Class sizes will be determined at the superintendents discretion.
10. All goats must be validated under the Texas Validation Program to be eligible for the show.
11. General show rules apply. **Entry fee-\$20.00/head.**

Market Lambs

1. Breeds will be as follows:

- A. **Fine wool**-this breed will include only purebred or grade Rambouillet or Delaine or a cross between the two breeds.
- B. **Fine Wool Crossbred**- will include lambs sired by a Suffolk, Hampshire, Corriedale or Columbia ram and out of fine wool ewe. Lambs that carry more than 50 percent medium wool breeding will go into a medium wool class.
- C. **Medium Wool**- will include purebred or grade medium wool or crosses of predominate medium wool breeding.
- D. **Southdown**- will include only purebred or grade South-down's.
- E. **Dorper**-will include only purebred or grade Dorper's.

Decisions as to how lambs will be classified will be left to the classifier of the show

2. There will be a Champion and Reserve of each of the above classes. The Grand Champion and Reserve champion will be named.
3. Class sizes will be determined at the superintendent's discretion.
4. All lambs must be validated under the Texas Validation Program to be eligible for the show.
5. Lambs must weigh a minimum of **70 lbs** and must have been shorn within 21 days of the show. Boots may be left on lambs.
6. Ewe lambs may be shown.
7. Ownership deadline is October 31, 2025.
8. General show rules apply. **Entry fee-\$20.00/head.**
9. Scrapie tag will be allowed to remain in lamb's ear.
